Each photograph is large and is often in monochrome: this makes them both inescapable and timeless, "both of which" says Harry, "I hope are true for wildlife." The image is never altered and he describes his work as almost documentary fine art which aims to recreate the exact moment he found himself in, with all the accompanying sights, sounds and emotions. Landscape has an important part to play too, as he believes that wildlife photography is about creating a mood, and the light, sky and background are crucial to this. If each photograph tells the story of its subject, then in a world where habitat destruction is an alarming reality, you cannot truly tell their story without their habitat.

The key for him is spending a little time with the animal. Just like humans, their personalities are gradually revealed over time and the observer can begin to distinguish their unique quirks and habits. These traits provide clues both to the personality of the subject, and to its next move.

Harry is involved in conservation efforts all over the world, from being on the front line with the Rhino poacher sniffer dog teams in Laikipia, Kenya to the Prints For Wildlife initiative which raised half a million dollars for the African Parks Network in under a month with his contribution selling out in 24 hours. The campaign was featured on Sky News, focusing on Tooth and Nail – one of the most dramatic wildlife photographs of the 21st century. He also sits on the board of Generation Tusk and acts as affiliated photographer, and he has donated numerous photos raising tens of thousands of pounds for this important cause.

"Charitable work is the backbone of my work, I have always said, even before I was professional, that I wanted my photography to be for wildlife as much as it is of wildlife."

At the heart of Harry's work is the belief that the photographer, not the camera, makes a photograph, so he never uses props or contraptions to get him in position, but relies instead on an intimate knowledge of and respect for wildlife. Treating his subjects with sensitivity and respect, photographing them in their own environment and on their own terms pervades each image with a deep sense of calm: "showing our world as it is supposed to be: wild and free." This ethical approach, as well as his unrelenting commitment to conservation charities, means that hanging his work is truly part of the environmental solution, not the problem.

"It's not about always being close and low, it's about creating a mood. Finding a moment of grace and simplicity in a maelstrom of life, that's what we set out to do every day."
